Collective effort to help remove invasive weed from Tūtaenui Reservoir

Keen gardeners will probably be familiar with Tradescantia, otherwise known as "wandering Jew" (which for obvious reasons is being phased out) or "wandering willie". It's a succulent, brittle weed that originates from South America and is known for its fast growth and thick mats of vegetation, which prevents seedlings from native trees and shrubs from establishing.

Herbicides and pesticides have varying success against Tradescantia, but it does have a natural and more effective predator in the Tradescantia Leaf Beetle, which feeds off the leaves and helps to control it spreading. These awesome critters are host specific, which means they don't eat anything other than Tradescantia and some closely related species. So, they're highly effective at controlling the spread of the weed without damaging any other plants.

Last week, Neil Gallagher from Rangitīkei District Council, Rory Johnson from Horizons Regional Council, and Dave Smith from the Tutaenui Stream Restoration Project oversaw the releasing some of these beetles at the Tutaenui Reservoir, where Tradescantia has been causing issues for a number of years now. Yellow spotted fungus was also released, which is proven to be a knockout combination with the beetles. The site the beetles and fungus have been placed in was carefully chosen so that they can establish themselves without interference from human activities. The hope is that if the beetles can be successfully established at the reservoir, they'll be able to do the grunt work of removing Tradescantia for years to come.

### Logging train to reduce strain on Napier - Taihape Road

Logging trains between Karioi and Napier are expected to take up to 3000 tonnes off the Napier – Taihape Road, easing the pressure on the deteriorating route.

Following the closure of Winstone Pulp International (WPI) last year, Ernslaw One who provided the logs that would be pulped were looking at an alternative option for them to continue selling the logs they harvested. Trains previously used to operate from Karioi with WPI sending pulp and lumber to Napier via Palmerston North, but this stopped when the mill was closed. Concerned about the wear and tear on the Napier – Taihape Road that logging

the Napier – Taihape Road that logging trucks contributed to, Mayor Andy Watson facilitated the discussion between Ernslaw One, KiwiRail and Napier Port that led to a deal being struck.

Some modifications had to be made at the WPI site for the purpose of loading logs onto trains, but the operation is now running, with the first train service taking place on Tuesday, 28 January.

In total, 21 log truck will be removed from the road with trains operating five days a week.



#### Taihape Town Hall & Library and Memorial Park Grandstand

Maycroft have completed the site investigations of the Taihape Town Hall & Library, and have put together a comprehensive assessment of the existing condition of the building.

While Maycroft was engaged through a Design and Build procurement model, the instruction was to focus purely on the seismic strengthening concept design as a first step. The intention was to establish cost estimates for seismic work, which is the main reason for the project. With this cost estimate, Council now have an understanding of what budget is available for the rest of the planned works.

Regarding the Memorial Park Grandstand, staff presented three concept design options along with estimated costs to Council in November 2024. Only one of these cost estimates was close to the remaining project budget, which would not see an upgrades made to the changing rooms on the lower level. Since the community is keen to see upgrades to the lower level, Council are waiting for the community to organise a meeting to discuss a way forward.
